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REPORT CARD	
Governor Greg Abbott Texans overwhelmingly elected Governor Greg Abbott, who campaigned against toll roads. He emphasized in the debates, "My plan does not involve any toll roads, period. I'm not interested in adding toll roads in my plan." He also promised on the campaign trail and again in his first state of the state address that he planned to fix Texas roads without more taxes, fees, debt or tolls. However, largely passive on toll legislation, Governor Abbott did not help the grassroots or the lawmakers seeking to curb tolls. Abbott's Transportation Commission has diverted more than \$1 billion in state funds to subsidize more toll roads, and his Commission continues to approve more toll roads at nearly every Commission hearing	С
Lt Governor Dan Patrick	
While we made progress in the Senate this session, Gov. Dan Patrick 's pick for Committee Chair of the Senate Transportation Committee, Robert Nichols , has been problematic from the beginning.	
Patrick failed to push one of our top reforms (that is in the GOP Platform) to remove tolls from roads that are paid for. He continues to bow to his committee chair who refuses to allow a hearing, much less a vote, on this key bill. Nichols also won't hear the bill to block gas taxes from subsidizing toll roads (double taxation). Nichols wants toll bureaucracies to continue tolls in perpetuity and allow them to extend the debt owed on toll roads by tying the financing together into one system to ensure no road is ever paid off. Nichols is also fine with using your tax money to build a toll road then charge you again to drive on it.	
Nichols also rewrote SB 312 in conference committee deliberately going outside the bounds of what conference committees can do and failed to fully inform his colleagues of the depth of the changes. Nichols watered down toll collection reform and two other anti-toll reforms, allowing certain toll projects to advance unabated. When the House overwhelmingly voted to de-criminalize failure to pay a toll bill by a vote of 136-3, Nichols and his side kick Rep. Larry Gonzales put criminalization back in.	B
Gov. Patrick and Sen. Nichols did keep their promise to block any private toll road contracts from being authorized (known as public private partnerships). It never came up in the Senate. These contracts put taxpayers on the hook for the private company's losses and result in toll rates as high as 90 cents a mile! Patrick did ask Nichols to pass Sen. Lois Kolkhorst's bill to stop the conversion of free lanes into toll lanes (another form of double taxation) and to require state funds to be repaid if used on toll projects (but Nichols gutted both in conference committee on SB 312). Sen. Don Huffines' bill, SB 637, to audit toll authorities (Regional Mobility Authorities) also passed the Senate (but never got a hearing in the House).	
Speaker Joe Straus	
Speaker Joe Straus ousted a friendly committee chair, Joe Pickett , and replaced him with a pro-toll Chair for House Transportation, Geanie Morrison , who blocked our reforms. After being in the House for over 20 years, she had never served on the Transportation Committee before and had no background in transportation.	
Morrison chose to move the worst bill of the session, HB 2861 to hand 20 Texas roads to private toll operators in 50-year sweetheart deals. Tolls on such projects can exceed 75 cents a mile. Thankfully, with the bipartisan effort of Pickett and the Freedom Caucus, HB 2861 was defeated by a vote of 79-51 (http://www.texasturf.org/2012-06-01-03-09-30/press-releases/texas-state-wide/2209-victory-grassroots-kill-private-toll-bill-secure-abbott-s-vision-for-toll-free-future). The one anti-toll bill Morrison heard was in the final weeks of the session and got out of committee too late to pass.	F
Straus' lieutenants tried to block every anti-toll amendment to the TxDOT sunset bill SB 312, particularly Geanie Morrison and the sunset bill's author, Rep. Larry Gonzales. Thankfully, their efforts to stymie anti-toll reforms were largely defeated, especially the toll collection reform amendment by Rep. Ina Minjarez that was adopted by a vote of 136-3!

The Methodology

This Report Card was determined strictly by record votes on key bills and amendments from both the 85th regular and special sessions. Legislators who authored anti-toll or property rights legislation received additional points, while those who authored the bills to hand our Texas freeways over to private toll operators in 50 year sweetheart deals were docked points.

Over 35 bills were filed to replace or curtail tolling or to make it more transparent and accountable. When factoring in property rights and efforts to restrict eminent domain abuse, the total came to 56 bills. In addition, 20 bills to stop or curtail high speed rail (at the hands of a private, foreign company planning to use the power of eminent domain) were filed. It should have sent a strong message to leadership that the taxpayers sent elected officials to Austin to significantly curb, if not stop, toll roads. However, only a handful of anti-toll bills got a hearing, four passed the Senate, and only one got a hearing in the House (and it wasn't heard until two weeks before the end of session and came out of committee too late).

The game changer this session was the sunset bill, SB 312, for the **Texas Department of Transportation** (TxDOT). It had to pass or the highway department would cease to exist. It was the vehicle we used to get our bills attached as floor amendments. With bi-partisan teamwork, especially with the help of the **Freedom Caucus**, seven pieces of anti-toll legislation were adopted in the final bill signed by the Governor. However, most anti-toll amendments were later watered down by members of the conference committee, Sen. **Robert Nichols** and Rep. **Larry Gonzales** in particular.

House leadership failed to hear or pass bills to: take tolls off the road when it's paid for, stop the flow of gas taxes to toll roads (which is a double tax), reform toll billing/collections, subject toll agencies to sunset review or an audit, restrict eminent domain use by private companies, as well as many bills to increase transparency and accountability.

The Senate Transportation Committee passed bills to audit to toll authorities (Regional Mobility Authorities), to prohibit the conversion of free lanes into toll lanes, prohibit the conversion of HOV lanes into toll lanes, and a bill to require repayment of any state funds used to subsidize toll projects. However, Sen. Nichols refused to even have a hearing on the bill to remove tolls from roads that are paid for or the bill to block the use of <u>any</u> state funds on toll projects (double taxation) — our two top priorities, both of which appear in the 2016 GOP Platform.

Bills used for Report Card <u>Transportation</u>

Passed the Senate, but not the House:



SB 637 (Huffines) - To audit RMAs

SB 399 (Kolkhorst) - To prohibit the conversion of free lanes into toll lanes.

SB 1143 (Hall) - To prohibit the conversion of HOV lanes into toll lanes.

SB 812 (Kolkhorst) - To require state funds to be repaid if used to subsidize a toll project.

SB 1588 (Huffines) - Repeal of vehicle inspection fee.

SB 977 (Schwertner/Kolkhorst) - To ensure no state funds will be used for private High Speed Rail.



TxDOT sunset bill passed both chambers and became law.

SB 312 (Nichols) - TxDOT sunset bill. This was the vehicle we used to turn our bills into amendments and get them attached to a must-pass bill (to get around House leadership who blocked all but one of our bills).

The votes we used for House members were on the following anti-toll amendments that had record votes...

Amendments to SB 312 in the House:

Amendment #12 (Pickett) - To require state funds to be repaid if used to subsidize a toll project. (Same language as SB 812 that passed the Senate.) ADOPTED



Amendment to Amendment #13 (Pickett) - To require repayment to be directed to the region where the funds came from. ADOPTED



Amendment #32 (Shaheen) - To remove tolls once the debt is paid. FAILED

Amendment #39 (Minjarez) - To cap administrative fines and fees on toll bills to \$48/yr and to decriminalize failure to pay a toll bill. The amendment also requires bills to be more prompt and transparent. ADOPTED



Motion to reconsider Amendment #12 (Martinez) - To try and strip Pickett's amendment to require repayment of any state funds used on toll projects (to prevent double taxation). **FAILED**



HB 2861 (Phillips) - To hand 20 Texas highways to private toll operators in 50 year sweetheart deals that use public funds to guarantee the private entity's losses and result in tolls as high as 90 cents per mile! Such Public Private Partnerships (P3s) represent corporate welfare and give the power to tax to private corporations taxpayers cannot hold accountable. We vehemently opposed this bill (the worst of the session with multigenerational impacts). Those who voted against it received points, and those who voted for it were penalized. **FAILED**

Property rights



SB 6 (Campbell) - Annexation reform to give residents a right to vote before being annexed by a city. PASSED SPECIAL SESSION, BECAME LAW



Amendment #25 (King, P.) - To allow residents in counties with a population under 500,000 to petition their county commissioners to force a vote before annexation.



SB 740 (Kolkhorst) - Eminent domain reform like requiring protection from damages, most recent appraisal to be disclosed to landowners, must prove entity actually has power to exercise eminent domain, more flexibility for landowners in admitting evidence into the record. DIED IN HOUSE



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
