REPORT CARD

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Governor Greg Abbott

One of the big reasons Texans didn't see any major toll road bills advance during the 86th legislative session was in large part due to Governor Abbott's 'No toll' pledge when he ran for office (and reiterated ever since). However, he didn't back any of our anti-toll reform bills, leaving all of them to die in committee. If the Governor had added our reforms to his emergency items as he did for Prop 7 when he took office, they would have passed. When the toll tax burden is now over \$3/mile on some Texas highways during rush hour, keeping the status quo doesn't go far enough to reduce this crushing tax burden on driving. *Texans need toll tax relief!*

Lt Governor Dan Patrick

Though none of our anti-toll reform bills got a hearing AGAIN, **Sen. Robert Nichols**, whom Patrick appointed as Senate Transportation Committee Chair, did stop every bad toll road and tax/fee hike bill that came over from the House. This was a victory and kept the grassroots in having to mount repeated fights to stop these bills on the floor of the Senate. Given the voting records of the senators during the 86th, all of the bad bills would likely have passed. However, as is the case with the Governor, keeping the status quo doesn't go far enough in reducing the overall toll tax burden felt daily by Texas drivers and families struggling to make ends meet. With non-toll highway expansion failing to keep up with the growth in congestion, few in our urban areas have a choice but to pay tolls to get to work.

Speaker Dennis Bonnen

The Speaker appointed Rep. Terry Canales as Chair of House Transportation, who betrayed the trust of voters by flip flopping on the toll issue after promising, in writing, that he was anti-toll when he ran for office and sought the endorsement of Texans for Toll-free Highways, PAC. Canales proceeded to pass virtually every bad toll road bill and many tax/fee hike bills all session long, including authoring one to extend the SH 130 public private partnership contract (on the road that's already gone bankrupt once) for another 20 years! Meanwhile, he sent our anti-toll reform bills to a subcommittee to die (giving them a hearing far too late in the session for them to have a prayer of passing), never bringing up a single one for a vote in committee despite massive grassroots support for it.

The Methodology

Two top priorities for the 86th Legislature:

- Remove the toll when the road is paid for (toll cessation).
- Expand toll collection reform to ALL toll entities, capping fines/fees, and removing the criminal penalty for unpaid tolls (impounding cars, blocking vehicle registrations).

While there were not record votes on our two anti-toll reform bills, there were 18 bills used to determine the grades of the 86th Legislature. Not all legislators voted on all 18 bills. Some were strictly committee votes, others were a vote by the full House or full Senate, but might not have made it to a floor vote in the opposite chamber. Below are the bills we tracked. Every lawmaker was notified prior to each vote of TURF's opposition and/or support of these bills and why.

NOTE: If a member authored one of our reform bills, that received a step up in their grade. Conversely, if a member authored one of the bad bills, they were downgraded by a step for each one.

Bills used for Report Card Transportation

BAD Bills:

HB 1287 (**Israel**) - Would have lowered the speed limits in urban districts (downtown areas, loose definition could apply to anywhere in a city) down to 25 MPH making them, in effect, like a school zone.

Fee hike bills (all attempted to do an end run around Gov. Abbott's pledge of no new road taxes or fees):

HB 3258 (**Minjarez, et al**) - A hike in the Advanced Transportation District sales tax in Bexar County. Passed House Ways & Means Committee and Calendars, but floor vote postponed multiple times due to lack of support.

HB 2814 - (Goodwin) - Would DOUBLE traffic fines on roads dubbed 'highway safety corridors.' Passed House Transportation Committee, but never made it any farther.

HB 130 (**Minjarez et al**) - Another \$10/year vehicle registration fee hike for Bexar County & border counties. Passed House Transportation Committee.

HB 642 (Raney) - Would allow unelected toll bureaucracies known as a Regional Mobility Authorities to increase vehicle registration fees by \$10 (presumably to subsidize their toll projects) if the county's minimum population is 190,000. This was local government's attempt at an end run around Gov. Abbott's 'No more tolls' pledge. Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, and the full Texas House. Died in Senate Transportation Committee.

HB 1666 (Martinez) - To increase the vehicle registration fee in Cameron, Willacy and Hidalgo Counties. Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, and the full Texas House. Died in Senate Transportation Committee.

HB 333 (Nevarez) - Bill to create another unelected Regional Mobility Authority in the Middle Rio Grande Valley (where there's virtually no congestion or need for toll roads anyway), and allow it to increase vehicles registration fees by \$20/year. This would have been a MEGA RMA involving 7 counties! Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, and the full Texas House. Died in Senate Transportation Committee.

Public Private Partnership bills (all attempted to do an end run around Gov. Abbott's 'No more tolls' pledge):



HB 4427 (Canales) - To extend the SH 130 foreign owned toll contract another 20 years. This privately-operated toll road already went bankrupt once. Extending the contract until 2062 is theft of public assets, corporate welfare, and a way to guarantee the profits of private corporations at the expense of Texas drivers and taxpayers. Passed the House Transportation Committee and Calendars Committee. Lacked support to go any farther.

HB 1951 (Krause et al) - To re-authorize unlimited public private partnership toll contracts, allow tolls to continue even after the road is paid for, among other anti-taxpayer gotcha provisions. One of the worst special interest bills of the session. One by one, every so-called toll payer protection was removed or watered down. Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, then lacked support to pass a vote of the full Texas House, so Krause was forced to withdraw his bill.

HB 2531/SB 1299 (Romero/Powell) - To allow regional public transit agencies in Dallas-Ft. Worth to engage in public private partnerships (with guaranteed profits, taxpayer loan guarantees, etc.). Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, vote of the full House. Failed to pass Senate Transportation Committee.

HB 1644 (Martinez) - Would have authorized 20 new foreign-owned toll roads in Texas, with taxpayerbacked loan guarantees and guaranteed profits. The North Tarrant Express toll rates imposed by foreign company, Cintra, exceed \$3/mile in rush hour.

HB 2578 (Thompson, Ed) - To exempt the private, foreign companies holding the contract for the SH 288 foreign owned toll project from the \$48/cap on toll fines and other caps on fees. Allows special exception to levy unlimited toll fines and exceed the cap lawmakers placed on public toll entities. Passed House Transportation Committee, Calendars Committee, and the full Texas House. Died in Senate Transportation

Over criminalization of drivers:

Committee.

HB 448 (Turner) - Nanny state car seat bill forcing two year olds (currently allowed to be forward facing) to be rear facing until 40 inches tall and 40 pounds (which is the size of the average 4-5 year old). The bill would have made parents criminals for violating it. The bill made it all the way to the Governor's desk. Thankfully, Gov. Abbott vetoed the bill. (Record Vote #372)

Good Bills:

Good government/property rights reforms:

HB 1631 (Stickland) - To ban red light cameras and remove the criminal penalty for red light tickets. This sets a needed precedent for de-criminalizing unpaid toll bills for many of the same reasons like how it's unconstitutional to allow a camera to bring a criminal offense against someone without a witness to the actual alleged violation (same with toll cameras as well as holding the owner of a vehicle liable not the actual driver who committed the offense). Passed and signed by the Governor.

HB 803 (Patterson) - To increase financial transparency of toll agencies to help the public and elected officials be able to determine how much these entities make in tolls, versus fines/fees, how much is going to retire the debt, are there surplus revenues, and can tolls come off certain projects that are technically paid off. Passed and signed by Governor.

SB 29 (Hall) - To end taxpayer funded lobbying. The state's 13 toll agencies hire lobbyists using taxpayer money to lobby against our anti-toll reforms (usually multiple lobbyists per agency). Until we end this practice, taxpayers don't stand a chance of getting meaningful reforms like removing the toll once the debt is paid off and capping these outlandishly high toll fines & fees. Failed to pass.

SB 421 (Kolkhorst) - Eminent domain reform to restore basic rights to landowners when facing forced condemnation by private pipeline companies. Failed to pass.

HB 347 (King, P) - To end tiered annexation and ensure all communities have the right to vote on being annexed by a city in Texas. Forced annexation without a vote by residents whose taxes would go up is taxation without representation (which is the principle

that started our anti-toll movement). Passed and signed by Governor.



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
